

A New and Improved Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity:

Grants, Partnerships and New Programs through the Guidance of God

John 14:13, NIV, is as follows, "And I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son." This scripture could not have been more true this past year at Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity. We have long felt a calling to do more in our community, but often questioned new ways we could be impactful without straying from the mission and values that define our organization. We sought God's guidance; and, in doing so, He provided in so many ways. Not only did he bless us with the courage and strength to start a Neighborhood Revitalization Program, he also provided us the tools to do so through new community partnerships and a grant to update our office equipment.



Neighborhood Revitalization (NR)

Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity has been building homes in Terre Haute and Vigo County since our founding in 1989. That's nearly 30 years of partnering with families in need and working with volunteers in our community to build decent, affordable homes. In that time, we've been able to help 68 families become homeowners. And while we're proud of this number, we also realize it is but a small percentage of the total number of homeowners in our community. Approximately 50% of homes in Terre Haute are owner occupied. But that is not to say that all of these homeowners have the capacity to maintain their homes whether it be from aging, a disability, or even low income. So why should we not strive to extend a hand up to them as well?

Habitat for Humanity's mission is to bring people together to build homes, communities, and hope. Our efforts have predominately focused on building new homes; however, there is a growing need in our community for repairs and renovations to homes already standing and neighborhoods already defined. Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity wants to use our construction experience and our strong volunteer base to begin addressing that need. We realize we cannot do this work alone as it takes much more than repairing houses to revitalize a neighborhood. Collaboration with donors, residents and other community organizations is key.

In 2015, we were extremely blessed to be invited to a series of community meetings organized by The Vectren Foundation. These meetings brought together local leaders with a vested interested in revitalizing the Ryves Neighborhood, and in the blink of an eye, God provided us with new partnerships to make a difference in our community. Through this collaboration, we will be able to make a bigger, lasting impact and serve more families in areas that go beyond housing. We will be able to repair homes and restore dignity to the surface of neighborhoods, assist our partners with community gardens and education, and most importantly empower neighborhood residents.



In 2017, we were able to complete our first NR project with the help of a grant from The Vectren Foundation. Homeowner Vickie Thompson, a longtime resident of the Ryves Neighborhood, was the first approved applicant of the new program. Vickie had a variety of exterior projects ranging from replacement of siding to fixing a garage door opener, but perhaps most beneficial was the new porch and railing installed in front. "The porch was uneven and when it rained, the water just sat up there," remarked Vickie. "And I know it was probably seeping through, making it bad for the foundation...so that [repair work on front porch] was a good blessing."

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A blessing that Vickie says people have been keen to notice, "It looks nice and I get so many compliments. 'Your house looks nice.' You know? People are paying attention."

And it is that highly visible improvement that makes Neighborhood Revitalization so impactful, empowering and successful. It's a simple change that acts as a catalyst attracting new homeowners, sponsors, donors, volunteers and community partners to our organization.

Homeowners are able to restore their homes; and often, their pride in homeownership. Sponsors and donors are able to see their dollar go further as these projects cost less than new construction. Therefore, with each donation, more families are served. Volunteers are able to get involved with seemingly less intimidating projects, and see benefits of

their service almost immediately as these projects have quick turnaround. And finally, community partners are able to lend a hand in their area of expertise making neighborhood revitalization go further than home repairs.

It's an exciting step forward in our mission to serve more families in Vigo County while raising awareness for our organization. And though it may be different from what we've done in the past, it will no doubt propel us into the future, our vision, mission and values unchanged.

For the next few years our program will focus on exterior home repairs ranging from replacing lights and siding to pouring new porches and installing stable railings. This program is only open to current homeowners in the Ryves Neighborhood, though we plan to expand in the next five years. WVCF Grant Awarded to Update Office Equipment

The Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity office was in desperate need of a new server and laptop to maintain efficient working conditions. We rely heavily on technology for our day to day business needs like any organization in the 21st century; however, it also helps us track donor information, volunteer hours, homeowner sweat equity hours, and service mortgages. As we wanted to be good stewards of our money, it was not an option to purchase the new equipment ourselves; therefore, we submitted a grant to the Wabash Valley Community Foundation (WVCF).

The WVCF is a foundation that awards grants to nonprofit organizations in Vigo, Clay and Sullivan counties in the areas of Community Development, Education, Arts & Culture, Religion and Health & Human Services. Their mission is to engage people, build resources and strengthen community in the Wabash Valley. As our missions align very closely, we thought the WVCF would be an excellent resource to help us make necessary changes.

Thankfully, the WVCF blessed our affiliate with a \$5,000 grant, which we were able to use to purchase new office equipment including a server, which is basically the technological heart of our organization, and updated computers for staff. With this updated technology, we are able to serve our homeowners better, keep our records safe and updated, and work more efficiently in ridding the community of inadequate housing.

So, as you can see, it's been quite a year for changes at Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity. The Lord has truly provided for us in ways we couldn't possibly imagine at the beginning of 2017. He's helping us to expand our mission and go further as a housing organization to serve more families. He's providing us the tools to do so successfully and without fear. So this next year, we will let Him guide us and listen to advice set forth long ago, "Do not fear, for I am with you; do not be dismayed, for I am your God; I will strengthen you and help you; I will uphold you with my righteous right hand." (Isaiah, 41:10, NIV)

These past experiences, his degree and his connection to Terre Haute, made him a natural choice for a local ReStore Manager. Aside from these qualifications, Tim believes personally in the mission of the ReStore. "I feel that the ReStore is of great value to the community helping local families improve their homes and living environments in a cost effective manner, as well as providing funding toward building affordable housing." And this belief also guides his long term goals for the ReStore. Tim envisions a ReStore that is bigger, in terms of both physical space and revenue, so that we can grow the number of affordable homes we build each year for qualified, low income families. When he's not at the ReStore, Tim can be found enjoying the great outdoors. He likes camping, fishing and horseback riding, as well as attending concerts and sporting events. He's volunteered with several local charities and even spent time as a volunteer youth football coach. We believe this desire to be involved and help others will make him very successful as our day-to-day operations manager at the ReStore. Welcome Tim!

Volunteer Spotlight: Robin Myers

Homeowner Selection Chair

Robin Myers started volunteering with Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity in 1996 after seeing first hand the need for improved housing. Her church at the time worked with kids from low income families in Terre Haute, so she was able to see the conditions some of these families were living in. Conditions, that Robin was able to relate to, "I had grown up through grade school with a single mom and had some of those experiences of living in not so great conditions." Her own personal experiences, coupled with those of families at her church, moved her to become an advocate for improved housing with Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity.

Over the years, Robin has taken on many different roles within our organization giving her true insight into all facets of Habitat for Humanity. Initially she served on the Board chairing a committee that organized the annual Hammer 'n' Nails BBQ. She then transitioned to Vice President of the Board. Around this time, board members were also asked to serve on some of our committees. Robin had long been interested in how our families were selected, so she chose to get involved with our Homeowner Selection Committee, which she has now chaired for the past several years.

She learned the ins and outs of selecting families based on Habitat's three foremost qualifications-need for improved housing,

ability to repay the loan and willingness to partner through sweat equity. She's seen years where Habitat has had an abundant number of applicants apply for our homeownership program, and she's seen years where finding qualified applicants has surprisingly been a struggle. Luckily these ups and downs have never been a deterrent to Robin's belief in the need for improved housing. "The need is still there and God has blessed me with the time and circumstances to be able to continue in the work [of] helping families genuinely improve an aspect of their lives," says Robin. "It is rewarding to try to help people that are doing their best to help themselves."

After all these years, Robin continues to volunteer with Habitat for Humanity and we are truly blessed to have someone within our organization with the insight, empathy, compassion and unwavering desire to help others. Robin has truly become one of our greatest resources and community advocates, and we are so thankful for her 20+ years of service.

From our Executive Director...

For the past two years, I have had the pleasure of serving as Secretary on the State Board of Directors for Habitat for Humanity of Indiana. At our last meeting, Gina Leckron, Habitat State Director, handed everyone a piece of paper and a marker. Written across the top of the paper were three simple words, "Why I Build"; and, with our marker, we were instructed to use one sentence to answer that imperative question. The first thing that came to my mind was "I build for the love of all children."

Every morning on my way to work I drive through the Ryves Neighborhood. Year after year I see children standing on street corners waiting for the school bus, wearing only sweatshirts and hoodies in freezing weather. I see boarded up doors and windows on old 2-story condemned houses. I see blue tarps flapping freely on roofs of countless homes. I see families consistently moving in and out of rentals, unable to find stability in housing. And though many are affected by this poverty, perhaps most impacted are the children.

Statistics tell us that poverty affects children in various aspects of their lives ranging from poor academic achievements to physical health problems. They get in trouble at school. They don't have a warm meal waiting for them when they get home. And what I've begun to understand recently since reading "A Framework for Understanding Poverty" is that children, who have been in poverty and have made the journey to middle class, largely do so through success in their relationships. Relationships which we, myself included, can begin to foster.

My main job at Habitat for Humanity, aside from keeping the affiliate focused on serving more families, is building new relationships whether that is with a resident of Ryves or with corporate funders such as The Vectren Foundation. In 2016, these two responsibilities came together when the affiliate made a conscience decision to start a Neighborhood Revitalization Program. Through relationships we had formed with other members of our community including corporations, nonprofits, and residents, we came to realize that we could serve more families by expanding our housing solutions to include home repairs and weatherization. And although new construction continues to play a vital role for our affiliate, this new step is a critical one in making a larger impact.

Moving forward, funding will be our largest constraint. We know there is as great a need for repairs as there is for affordable housing; however, there is

less funding available for this type of work. And, while homeowners will pay for repairs done to their home, these payments will do little to make a Neighborhood Revitalization Program sustainable due to quick turnaround of projects. We will need other sources of funding-grants, individual donations, in-kind services-if we wish to continue this program for years to come. We are asking for your help. We've included a remittance envelope in this newsletter to make sending a donation quick and easy. Please help us to help more families in Vigo County.

The ReStore is a great place to donate your gently used furniture, usable building materials and even working appliances. We then sell them at a fraction of the price making all items affordable for members of our community! Did you also know that the ReStore plays a very important role in our construction efforts? All income from these sales goes towards



building homes. So every purchase at the ReStore helps families in need build with Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity!

All donations are tax deductible and are accepted at the ReStore during normal business hours. We also provide an expanded pick-up service to make donating easy. Pick-ups must be prearranged and scheduled with our ReStore Driver. We are unable to haul away trash or sort items, so please have donations ready to go for a pick-up.

The ReStore will accept the following items...

- New and usable building material such as lumber, insulation, hardwood and tile flooring, windows, doors, etc.
- New and usable kitchen and bathroom cabinets, faucets and counter tops
- New and used appliances that are in good working order
- New and gently used indoor and outdoor furniture
- New, surplus or discontinued items from local hardware stores, building contractors, landscape companies, etc.
- New and used light fixtures that are in good working order
- Kitchen items such as cups, plates, bowls, etc.
 - *please note the ReStore has the ability to turn down any donation based on demand, space, condition, etc.

The ReStore will not accept the following items...

- mattresses and box springs
- clothing, bedding, etc.
- broken items
- items needing repair as we don't have the facilities to make even minor repairs
