## Habitat Raffle Coming Soon!



## Since our founding in 1988, Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity has worked hard to help people build or improve the place they call home.

We've accomplished this with hammers and nails of course, but also by partnering with **Partnerships** individuals and organizations to make a broader impact in the lives of our homeowners; and more recently, our neighborhoods and our community at large. We know our work is most transformative when we come together and focus on improving overall guality of life, which is why we partner with local community organizations to address a variety of needs ranging from education to community gardens and healthy eating options.

This idea of transformation through partnership has guided our efforts in recent years. We are still committed to building new homes, but we also plan to continue expanding our services to help more families in need.

This year specifically we focused on partnerships with local organizations and businesses which support our vision, mission, and values. We researched new grants and funding opportunities to grow our neighborhood revitalization program. We connected with residents and hosted events to improve relationships between neighbors and community organizations. We supported the community where we work. And, we continue to look forward, hopeful and excited for what the new year will bring.

## Indiana State University to Sponsor 72nd House

In September 2018, as part of her Fall Address, Indiana State University President Deborah J. Curtis announced ISU's plans to sponsor their third Habitat house, which will be the 72nd built by our affiliate.

Wabash Valley Habitat for Humanity and ISU have a long-standing partnership and students and faculty from the university regularly volunteer throughout the year, working on our construction site and sitting on our board and committees. Habitat for Humanity also serves as a host site for ISU's annual Donaghy Day, which encourages incoming freshman to get involved in their community. This past year, we led students through a beautification project in the Ryves Neighborhood, which is where the new ISU build will be located.

Construction is set to begin in September 2019 and homeowner selection is currently underway. Fundraising efforts have already begun and many events including a Trivia Night and Craft Brews and Brats Event are currently in the planning process. ## GRANTS

This year we were fortunate to receive grants for both our Neighborhood Revitalization (NR) Program and our Construction Program.

Grants received for NR were utilized for exterior home repairs (porches, railings, siding, roofs, etc.) in the Ryves Neighborhood. Homeowners must apply for this program, fall within certain income guidelines, and repay a portion of the loan for work completed. They also partner with Habitat through Sweat Equity hours either on the work site or with one of our community partners. Projects completed this year for homeowners included a new porch awning, a new HVAC system (completed by Joe's Mechanical) and new roof (completed by Poplar Roofing). The ReStore may be an organization that people give to, but in November, the ReStore became an organization that gave back and restored the community they call home.

In August, Jesse arrived at work and found a homeless individual asleep on a couch outside. He went inside and told his colleague Tina about the situation noting it was not the first time something like this had happened, and it likely would not be the last. In that instant, Tina knew they had to do something for the homeless population in Terre Haute.

A previous outreach mission trip through her church gave her inspiration for her own outreach event. During a team meeting,

she asked the rest of the staff what they thought about having some kind of event where homeless individuals would be given warm clothes for winter. To her delight, the staff was 100% on board to move this idea forward.

Within a few days, the buzz of helping was in the air and they began dividing work for the event amongst themselves. Over the course of the next few weeks, donations began pouring in from individuals in the community and local churches and organizations were asking to get involved. Then, Jason joined the ReStore staff and asked to serve a warm meal of chicken n' noodles, mashed potatoes and green beans at the event. DJ Brad McNeil agreed to play music during the event and Alicia Tanner wanted to give away free haircuts. Everything was falling into place and the staff could hardly wait for November 17th to arrive.

On the day of, people began arriving at the store hours before, lining up around the building in anticipation. This line remained constant throughout the event with over 300 people coming through for blankets, jackets, socks, and a warm meal. Over 50 volunteers were on hand to help set up, hand out collected items, serve food and much more!



As the night came to an end, the ReStore staff couldn't believe how smoothly they had pulled off such an event, it was even bigger and better than any of them imagined! And through it all, there were smiles, joy and laughter from attendees and staff alike. They couldn't have asked for a better experience. It was great for the community and the staff bringing both the ReStore team and the community closer together.

"There's a feeling with this place," says Tina, ReStore cashier, "We all feel like we belong here." And the rest of the staff seems to agree. They've been called to work together and they're making the most of their time, excited for what the future holds.
